

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HIGHER EDUCATION TO PROMOTE TRANSFORMATION

Transformation means more than numbers, more than race says Minister of Higher Education and Training, Naledi Pandor.

Talking to delegates who attended the colloquium on Transformation on Higher Education at Emperors Palace in Kempton Park earlier this week, Minister Pandor explains that there is clear evidence of a continued significant dissatisfaction with higher education's efforts at transformation.

"For some, the changes that have been made are described as symbolic compliance rather than a genuine attempt to effect fundamental change." Minister Pandor says.

Listing the challenges to be addressed, Minister Pandor says there is a need to bring more women into leadership, especially as higher education leaders.

She says the second challenge is to nurture and develop more senior black and women academics who are competent and comfortable in their craft.

The third challenge is to work really hard at successfully converting improved access, into successful transformation.

"More black and women students should access and succeed in critical fields of study such as engineering, information technology, medicine and complex economics." Minister Pandor ends.

The colloquium was attended by stakeholders in the sector, including the Ministry; Departmental officials; representatives of University South Africa (USAf), the Council on Higher Education (CHE); the South African Union of Students (SAUS), the Transformation Study Group (TSG); the Transformation Managers Forum (TMF); the Higher Education Transformation Network (HETN); the Commission for Gender Equality (CGE), and the South African Human Rights Commission (SAHRC) as well as institutional representatives.

EXCITING CROWD SOURCING INITIATIVE FOR STUDENTS

Launched in June 2017, FeenixTM, enables all South Africans to get involved in solving the tertiary education funding crisis and is a community-assisted fundraising solution with tax-based incentives (Section 18A) for both individuals and businesses.

FeenixTM provides a unique opportunity for students to take their higher education funding goals into their own hands by raising the funds they require through their immediate networks and communities, while also providing funders with a tax-deductible donation structure (Section 18A) and the potential to maximise their B-BBEE scorecard.

FeenixTM offers B-BBEE points in the SED (socio-economic) and SD (skills development) sectors.

Feenix.org is a crowdfunding platform and thus funding is not guaranteed and the more active a student is in promoting and sharing their profile the more likely they are to receive assistance from their network or community.











HOW DOES IT WORK?

- 1 Students register on the platform and create a student profile to motivate for funding.
- Businesses and individuals register to create a funder profile.
- 3 Funders can then **search for students** they would like to fund.
- 4 Funders are able to donate either the full or partial amount outstanding for a specific student or contribute to the FeenixTM pool fund that is distributed to students that meet specific B-BBEE socio-economic criteria.

INFRASTRUCTURE - MORE BUILDINGS ON THEIR WAY

SPU IS ON ITS WAY TO PREPARING NEW BUILDINGS FOR 2020 AND 2021.

Nine contractors selected

In response to the local community call to be involved in the capital development projects, SPU has procured nine contractors: Major Works, Medium and Refurbishment Works, Small Works and Civil Works.

Six local contractors appointed

This has provided for six local contractors to be involved.

Main contractor projects

The main contractors appointed will complete buildings on the Science and Education precincts on Central Campus, the Bulk Services Building and a Student Canteen on South Campus.

NAS academic building on Central Campus

Planned on Central Campus for occupation at the beginning of 2020 is the NAS Academic Office Building which includes a 165 seater raked auditorium and offices for the Head of School and Heads of Departments.

It is expected that by mid-2020, the NAS Applied Sciences Building will be available. This building contains on the ground and first floor, two 320 seater raked auditoriums, two 180 seater raked auditoriums and four 90 seater classrooms which will increase the generic classroom options substantially.

Student Dining Rooms to be built

Once the contractor has completed this building, he will proceed to a Student Dining Room which will be open from 07:00 until 21:30 in order to provide meals for those in Student Housing in South Campus and adjacent properties.



Arts Block to be ready in the middle of 2020

Also expected to be ready in the middle of 2020 is the Arts Block, designed for both Humanities and Education.

This building includes facilities for the Education Foundation Phase and Humanities Heritage Programmes.

South Campus will see the building of an iconic concrete building, housing all the bulk storage water requirements, potable water, fire water, grey-water and associated filtration and pumping systems.

Also included are the standbygenerator, LV Metering and the chillers for TABS (Thermal Activated Building System).

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SPU MAKES PSC PLEDGE

Recently, Vice-Chancellor Professor Yunus Ballim signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Public Service Commission (PSC).

The MOU is part of the University's overall commitment towards partnerships and engagement with the broader community and stakeholders in the province and across the country.

Professor Ballim emphasises that SPU efforts in public management seek to make a difference and thereby ensure that "we build a cadre of ethical, capable and motivated individuals for effective delivery of service and to deepen development interventions in the province and across the country."

The University also pledges to uphold and promote the values and principles embodied in the Constitution as it relates to the work of public institutions and individual public officials.

The University is also committed to working with the PSC on deepening research on service delivery challenges in the province and enhancing debates on the performance of public institutions for more effective and responsive delivery and impact.

The MOU will open opportunities for academics and students to make a difference through research and more active community engagement initiatives.

CARINA TRUYTS LEADS KIMBERLEY LEG OF \$1-MILLION RESEARCH PROJECT

Humanities' anthropology lecturer Carina Truyts is part of a team that applied for, and won, a \$1- million IDRC research grant for a three-year project titled 'Nourishing Spaces'.

This project is investigating the link between non-communicable disease (such as diabetes) and food systems in six African cities: Nairobi and Kisumu in Kenya, Windhoek and Oshakati in Namibia, and Cape Town and Kimberley in South Africa.

Carina is leading the Kimberley research.

She is currently conducting interviews in Galeshewe that ask about lifelong food experiences and will continue with ethnographic immersion and analysis over the next year.

The project runs for three years and aims to create links between communities, the university and other stakeholders such as provincial health.




EDUCATION'S EMMA GROENEWALD TELLS THE STORY OF IDENTITY IN PHD

An interest in the way Namaqualand learners from different backgrounds, cultures and communities create identities led to Dr Emma Groenewald's research in identity construction of students at a University.

Emma, who was born in Petrus Steyn, joined SPU in November 2014 after which she started her PhD through the University of Free State.

She says that she is humbled and inspired by the stories of the participants.

"They have enriched my perspective on the meaning of identity and otherness beyond what I could have imagined.



She completed her PhD at the end of 2017 and plans to conduct a follow-up project to bring a deeper understanding of how the same students are influenced by higher education in terms of reviewing and rewriting their narrative identities.

SPU GRADUATES TO BENEFIT WITH ACCENTURE

SPU and Accenture South Africa signed a Memorandum of Understanding on 10 October 2018 to launch the internship programme during a groundbreaking MoU signing ceremony.

Accenture is a global management consulting and professional services firm that provides strategy, consulting, digital, technology and operations services.

The signed MoU will create opportunities for ICT graduates from SPU to join and be part of the first University-based Accenture Internship programme.



EDUCATION

SPU SASOL INZALO PROJECT TAKES SCIENCE TO SCHOOLS

SPU's Inzalo Project is an outreach to Northern Cape schools to promote science education sponsored by Sasol.

The project, which has been operating for a year, aims to identify and interact with schools where there is a need for support and for building capacity in the field of science education.

SPU, together with the Northern Cape Department of Basic Education (NCDoBE) and the Sasol Inzalo Foundation seeks to establish collaborative partnerships with schools in the Northern Cape in an effort to improve the quality of science education by providing these schools with educational resources which they otherwise lack or infrastructural or human resource challenges they may experience.

The project is also geared towards the facilitation of science-related experiments and demonstrations at participating schools as well as providing guidance to science educators.

The aim of the project is:

- To provide training opportunities to facilitators from SPU and NCDoBE in the use of the mobile laboratory.
- To travel to underperforming schools with the mobile laboratory in order to support, improve and develop the necessary skills and knowledge needed in the performance of science-related practical work such as experiments and demonstrations.
- $\bullet \ \ \, \text{To expose learners to the values and use of science-related technologies in a real-life context.}$

The pilot project highlighted the need for some form of intervention on behalf of science educators within the Frances Baard District.

Four high schools were selected: Emmanuel Secondary, Tshireleco Secondary, St Boniface Secondary, Homevale Secondary and one primary school, Herlear Primary.

The focus of the 2018 project was on Grade 10: Physical Sciences (Physics and Chemistry) and Life Sciences & Grade 6: Natural Science-Intermediate Phase.

During the advocacy week, school visits to participating schools also focused on school lab inspection/availability of resources and equipment/school and teachers' timetables.

SPU Project Co-ordinator Luchmen Poonawassy witnessed the first visit of the mobile lab to Emmanuel Secondary for Life Science demonstration.

Subsequent visits were made to the other participating schools for the Life Science demonstrations. Senior science students' participation was incorporated into the school visit presentations, under the guidance of their respective lecturer (co-presenter).

Intermediate students at Grade 6 level for Natural Sciences were also assisted. Information was gathered on the progress of the project through feedback from lecturers and science educators who are participating in the project and an ETDP-SETA intern was appointed to SPU as a lab assistant.

STUDENTS GET ENTREPRENEURSHIP GROOMING


