ACADEMIC ORIENTATION 2021

The Academic Orientation Week kicked off from 8 to 12 March 2021 for first-time entering students and was presented by the Student Academic Support Unit of the Centre for Teaching, Learning and Programme Development (CTLPD).

The aim of the academic orientation was to develop students' computer literacy skills and introduce them to the teaching and learning methodologies applied at the University such as the basic operations of a laptop and introduce them to the Learning Management Systems.

A blended-learning approach was used where sessions were presented online (through Microsoft Teams) and live streamed in specific venues on campus to accommodate and provide individual support by Orientation Tutors as and when required. Students were provided with an in-depth demonstration on navigating Moodle and accessing computer and academic literacies through online resources accessible from the SPU Library and Resource Centre. Senior students formed part of the programme where they shared and reflected on their experiences regarding online learning, the challenges experienced and the various strategies they have used to overcome these challenges and concluded with a discussion on the available student academic support resources at CTLPD such as the tutorship programme.

The outcome was to ensure that students familiarize themselves with the resources provided to them to ensure effective teaching and learning and, to bring across a positive mind-set for self-directed learning and effective study skills.

A majority of students attended and participated in the academic orientation sessions through the online platform, by logging on either from their residence rooms or at home, thereby taking advantage of the flexibility brought by online learning.

The Academic Orientation evoked an immediate positive reaction from students which has contributed positively towards SPU's commitment in ensuring that students experience a seamless transition from high school to higher education.

2021 STUDENT LEADERS

The Student Affairs department is a non-academic support and student development service. Each year, they send out a call for applications from senior students for student leader positions to aid in enriching the lives of students.



The student leaders arrived early in March to undergo training provided by various departments within the University, as well as from external partners. They were warmly welcomed by the Acting Senior Manager of Student Affairs, Ms Nthabiseng Afrika and were addressed by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Professor Mary-Jean Baxen who discussed with them, the SPU vision and mission and provided a brief account of the remarkable growth the University has achieved since its inception.

All student leaders were trained on how and when to refer students' that need help or advice. They received training on security protocols and green routes; COVID-19 protocols and induction on the facilities and dining hall rules. They also received information on how to have a positive presence on social media, and to communicate effectively inside the University.

Student leaders also received training on digital learning and information literacy so that they can aid any student experiencing difficulties in these areas.

The Student Affairs department presented their different portfolios and explained how they serve and assist students at SPU. Their core focus was around issues of confidentiality, professional interaction with fellow students, consent, and issues around gender-based violence (GBV) within the SPU community.

Of the health related topics presented, the main paradigm was on mental health resilience and maintaining a healthy lifestyle through exercise, healthy eating and the use of condoms at all times.

STUDENT LEADERS IN STUDENT AFFAIRS COMPRISE:

Peer Mentors

These are senior students assigned to assist and guide first-time entering students through their first-year at university. The aim is to ensure a smooth transition into the university community. Every first-year student is allocated to a peer mentor following their registration at #MySPU.

Peer Educators

This group of student leaders are trained to educate their peers in health and psycho-social issues, on campus and in residences. They will be focussing on health matters centred around the youth such as, Sexually Transmitted Infections (STI's)/ HIV and unintended pregnancies.

Sub-Wardens

These are students that assist the wardens in residences and serve as a liaison with fellow students.

Student Affairs is grateful to all departments in SPU who played a role in the training of the student leaders and would like to thank their external partners, Lifeline and Barefoot Campaign for being part of this training to ensure that the student leaders are well equipped to execute their duties in 2021.







FISHBOWLS, BEANS, FAKE MONEY, MUM, DAD, GOGO AND MATHEMATICS

What do these have to do with mathematics? In this case, everything.

The University of Free State's (UFS) Family Math initiative is a programme, funded by SANRAL and developed by the Science-for-the-Future (S4F) employees at UFS. Dr Cobus van Breda, Programme Director for Science-for-the-Future, and his team established the S4F programme and SPU is one of the partner universities.

The development of this programme considers the enormous challenges encountered by South African teachers which include, among others, a lack of resources, inadequate parental involvement and the challenge of discrepancies between the language of teaching and learning, and learners' home language. The Family Math programme aims to address these issues by not only involving teachers, but also involves learners and their parents.

SPU was invited to collaborate on this project and Grade 3 teachers in the Warrenton and Jan Kempdorp areas attended handson learning sessions conducted by Dr Glynnis Daries, Head of Education Studies and Dr Tracey Herman, Lecturer for Psychology in Education in the School of Education. These sessions took place at the Andalusia Primary School in Jan Kempdorp. In attendance were 29 teachers from 10 local schools as well as the Chief Education Specialist for Foundation Phase, Mrs Mosadie Kruger, and the subject advisor for Foundation Phase in the Francis Baard area, Mrs Ntoaki Mosinki.

The sessions allowed teachers to explore and 'play' with concrete materials such as paper fish and fishbowls to understand problem solving approaches, beans and a number-line to encourage mental math and fraction cards. All these activities are aligned to CAPS and can be used to facilitate various topics in mathematics.



The teachers then held parent workshops at their respective schools where parents sat with their children and together worked through the activities. This enabled parents (and in many cases grandparents, aunts, uncles or older siblings) to use the resources at home to assist learners to consolidate work done in class. This initiative was a huge success as parents became involved in their children's mathematics education.









SCHOOL OF ECONOMIC AND MANAGEMENT SCIENCES SIGNS MOU WITH UNIVERSITI TEKNOLOGI MARA

The School of Economic and Management Sciences (EMS) signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with the Universiti Teknologi MARA (UiTM) in Malaysia which will pave the way for the promotion and collaboration on international academic and research matters, specifically in the field of Accounting.

The MOU between SPU and UiTM was initiated by Professor MD.Humayun Kabir, Associate Professor in the School, as a culmination of his existing collaborative efforts with the Faculty of Accountancy at UiTM.

EMS will collaborate with the UiTM by receiving support in the following areas:

- Develop new programmes in the accounting discipline at SPU and obtain accreditation from international accounting and auditing professional bodies.
- Undergraduate and postgraduate students' mobility between the two institutions through an exchange programme.
- Accounting research collaboration in the areas of mutual interest to both parties.
- Exchange of academic materials which are made available by both parties.
- Exchange of academic scholars during academic development.
- Sponsorship of joint seminars, workshops, and other academic meetings on matters of mutual interest in areas of accounting.
- Consolidate expertise and resources in organizing accounting workshops and conferences.

The main goals of this partnership are to strengthen, promote and develop international academic and accounting research co-operation between the two universities in the training programmes, student and staff exchange programmes, and organizing and hosting international accounting conferences at both SPU and UiTM.







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STUDENTPRENEUR ELECTED AS DEPUTY CHAIRPERSON

In March 2021, the 3rd annual Entrepreneurship Development in Higher Education (EDHE) Kick-Off took place online across 3 days, with a key focus on encouraging entrepreneurship against all odds.

Final year SPU BCom student, Chad Lucas, a former SPU EDHE intervarsity regional candidate joined this online event that included champions for entrepreneurship development across South African universities.

This platform was used to reflect on the EDHE and presented the opportunity to elect new leadership to serve on the national Studentpreneurs Community of Practice (CoP). Its purpose is to leverage and build support structures that may aid small businesses owned by students and thus serve as a mouthpiece for student entrepreneurship by identifying the challenges faced as well as the opportunities for student entrepreneurs at higher education institutions.

At this event, Mr Lucas was officially elected as Deputy Chairperson of the national EDHE Studentpreneur CoP. He will be guided by Ms Gail Motlhaudi, Lecturer in the School of Economic and Management Sciences, who is a standing member of the national EDHE CoP for Student Entrepreneurship (staff) and will be working closely alongside Ms Phetha Mchunu from the University of the Witswatersrand, who was also elected as Chairperson.

PROFILE: SPU'S FULL PROFESSORS

Over the next few months we will profile SPU's Full Professors, whose appointment represents a significant growth milestone for the University.

PROFESSOR RAMOS EMMANUEL MABUGU

Ramos Emmanuel Mabugu is currently Professor in Economics in the School of Economic and Management Sciences. He is also currently a Research Fellow at Stellenbosch University in South Africa.

Professor Mabugu earned his PhD in economics from Gothenburg University in Sweden at the age of 29. At Sol Plaatje University, Professor Mabugu teaches undergraduate and postgraduate courses in Microeconomics, Macroeconomics and Public Development Economics. He actively participates in continuous learning through conferences and professional research and strongly believes in students' abilities to learn and become knowledgeable within the right environment.

The role of full Professor at SPU is a very interesting one for Professor Mabugu. A professor in a relatively young university needs to be personable, supportive, but also at times stubborn. For example, Professor Mabugu mediates staff issues, interacts with students, parents, friends and potential donors. In those interactions, Professor Mabugu is conscious and fully supportive of the goals of the School and the University, and hopes to create an enabling workplace environment, where colleagues and students feel appreciated for the contributions that they make, and where they shine and take pride in being associated with this university.

Professor Mabugu holds his ground as colleagues in the Senate Research Committee will attest, especially when it comes to quality expectations. Professor Mabugu is best known in academia for his work which pioneered construction and application of applied general equilibrium coupled with microsimulation models to policy analysis in Africa. He has written widely on economics and economic policy in leading academic economic journals, books and popular press.

He has been invited on several occasions as a keynote speaker at leading academic conferences and was awarded a visiting fellowship award from Curtin University in Australia in recognition of his contributions to intergovernmental fiscal relations modelling.

He has consulted widely on internationally funded projects, including for the Forum of Federations (Canada), IDRC (Canada), Sida (Sweden), World Bank, United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), International Food Policy Research Institute (IFPRI) and many African governments. Prior to joining SPU, Professor Mabugu headed the research

and policy division at the Financial and Fiscal Commission, a position equivalent to a Deputy Director General. Before that, he was at the University of Pretoria and the University of Zimbabwe. While at the University of Pretoria, he was instrumental in setting up a collaborative environmental economics M.Sc. and Ph.D.

Professor Mabugu was twice invited to be part of a fivemember international team of resource persons to run an international applied general equilibrium course at the prestigious Abdus Salam International Centre for Theoretical Physics (ICTP) in Miramare-Trieste, Italy.





ALUMNAE ON THE MOVE

Ms Tshegofatso Andries, a B.Ed student who was recently awarded her degree at SPU's 2021 Virtual Graduation Ceremony, was appointed as a Core Lecturer for the Habitable Planet Workshop (HPW).

This programme run by the Applied Centre for Climate and Earth Systems Science (ACCESS), employs innovative curriculum using South Africa's globally unique physical, biological, and cultural landscapes to introduce 3rd and 4th year students to the concept of Earth System Science. The purpose of the Core Lecture Programme is to train teachers for the highly successful ACCESS/ DST Habitable Planet Programme that is run 3-4 times a year across Southern Africa, aimed at developing participants general presentation skills, as well as developing skills in researching and presenting on a specialist topic.

According to Tshegofatso her interest in this programme peaked when she attended a public lecture in her first year at SPU, whereafter she applied to be a participant. She progressed to being a pioneer and now an official HPW alumni. She credits the inaugural Emerging Student Leaders Programme at SPU as her helm which gave her the inspiration to step out of her shell and believes this was a stepping stone in developing her leadership potential and has assisted her in becoming the leader she was meant to be. As a Core Lecturer, Tshegofatso takes up leadership positions on the planning committee for these workshops.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic HPW hosted its first online workshop in August 2020 for participants from Africa and India where Tshegofatso co-presented alongside a PhD student. The workshop also featured a keynote lecture by an Astro-Biologist Professor from the University of Florida in the United States. Following strict health and safety regulations, Tshegofatso also presented a face-to-face workshop at the HPW32 in Pietermatritzburg, hosted by UKZN that was highly rated by the participants.



Reflecting on her own journey, Tshegofatso advises students to never shy away from seeking help and encourages them to engage with their peers and to know that there is help available at the University. She stated that students should not limit themselves only to their respective field of study or to succumb to peer pressure. She advocates the use of fear, failure, and disappointment to serve as a driver to reach and attain goals and to be actively involved in the SPU community.

Tshegofatso disclosed that as an epileptic patient, she was consistently reminded by medical professionals of how rare it is for anyone in her condition to have completed matric in record time. Despite challenges faced at university, due to the unconscious bias of some people, she remained inspired to push herself beyond that which society thought she was capable of doing.

CONGRATS ON YOUR QUALIFICATION!

Ms Theresa Zengeya obtained her Master of Education degree with a specialisation in Education Management from the University of the Free State.

Her research, entitled Considerations of Talent Management in Retention of Academics: A case of the National University of Lesotho, aimed to investigate the contribution of talent management practices at the National University of Lesotho in the retention of talented academics.

The study was informed by Pierre Bourdieu's social theory and Michael Armstrong's equity theory. Bourdieu's theory was used to offer insight on the various capitals, and how these could be instrumental in the design and implementation of talent management practices to increase retention of talent at universities. To further understand talent management narratives, an overview of talent management practices was done followed by a discussion on the current possible challenges that could affect the implementation of successful talent management practices meant to retain talented academics.





Ms Natalie Smith graduated from the University of Free State with a Master of Education degree.


Her study looked at the influence of current assessment practices on learner performance, because the way learners perform, informs decision-making in classrooms and the curriculum.

Learners' performance tells a story of what is happening in schools, and whether, and to what extent, learning takes place. Assessment outcomes pave the way for planning and give an indication if change and support are needed.

The aim of the study was to determine if formative assessment had an influence on the language proficiency of Grade 9 Afrikaans home language learners at one school.

By looking at the problem from a complexity theory viewpoint, Ms Smith tried to understand why change is necessary from time to time – perhaps also in relation to assessment strategies.
